

A reflection from the Pastor

Resurrection. We hear a lot about this phenomenon of one rising from the dead or returning to life. One of the central tenets of our faith, we proclaim that Jesus was resurrected and rose from the dead after three days. It is indeed with the eyes of faith that we trust in the resurrection event. And yet, each time we rise above our sinfulness, particularly after the forgiveness we receive in the Sacrament of Penance, we return to life in Christ. It is a moment of spiritual resurrection. Our bodily resurrection will come at the end of time, when Jesus comes to judge the living and the dead.

In today's gospel we hear that the Sadducees, who deny any resurrection, tried to test Jesus with a question about re-marriage and whose wife would she be at the time of the resurrection. The answer, which came in truth, is that there is no giving in marriage to one another in heaven. There is only one bride-groom and that is Jesus. We all become his bride. In the resurrection at the end of time, we become his spouse. That is precisely why we try to get it right here on earth. Marriage is a witness here on earth, when done in love, of the union of bride to groom (Jesus) at the resurrection. And so that is why we take the covenant between man and wife so seriously; it is a sacred sign of the love God has for us and calls us to for all eternity. In your relationships this week, strive for moments of resurrection – new life even amidst struggles – and see Christ who has already done it. Fr. Ty

Fall Scripture Class

Understanding the Bible

The fall scripture series began with our comprehensive look at the bible.

The course is designed to help understand each of the books of the Bible.

Dates: **Tuesdays, November 20 – December 4 in the Heritage Room. 7:00 – 8:15 p.m.** no Nov. 13.

All adults are invited to attend. Religious Education teachers are strongly encouraged to attend. If you don't have a bible, one will be furnished.

Some Notes from the Third Class –

We watched a video showing the construction of the ark of the covenant which Moses erected at the base of Mount Sinai. We then began our study of the Former Prophets: Joshua, Judges, 1 & 2 Samuel, 1 & 2 Kings

1. Joshua, written by the Deuteronomist writer speaks of the conquest of Canaan and its distribution, ending up with the dismissal of the Transjordan tribes, and Joshua's farewell. The period covered takes place around 1224 B.C.

2. Judges also written by the Deuteronomist writer is a group of stories of local heroes/leaders/judges and how the people fail to uphold the covenant. Period of the Judges was from 1200 – 1050 B.C. Among some of the more famous judges in this period were: Deborah, Gideon, and Samson.

3. 1 & 2 Samuel. Samuel who was living around 1050 B.C. The book was also written by the Deuteronomist writer consisting of a series of stories; birth and youth of Samuel, the loss and return of the ark, Samuel as Judge, establishment of the monarchy, reign and rejection of Saul, Book 2 > David becomes king of Judah and Israel, and the reign of David. Contains the story of David and Goliath.

4. 1 & 2 Kings was also written by the Deuteronomist writer. From the time of Solomon to the destruction of the temple and into exile 961-561.

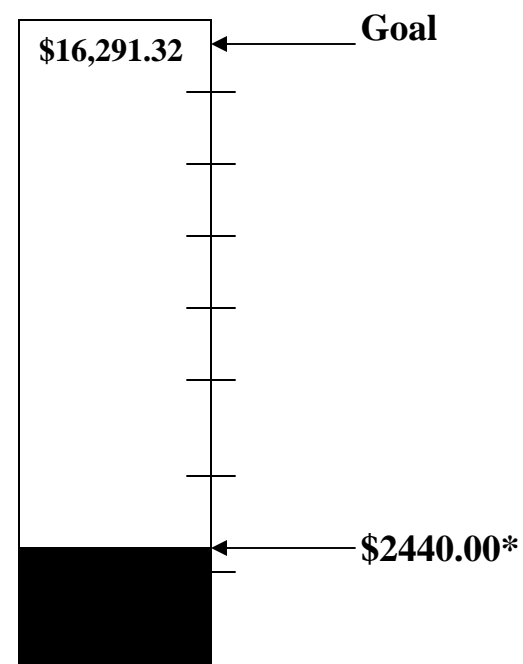
Quinceañeras

Readings to Meditate on for next week

Reading 1 - Malachi 3:19-20a

Lo, the day is coming, blazing like an oven, when all the proud and all evildoers will be stubble, and the day that is coming will set them on fire, leaving them neither root nor branch, says the LORD of hosts. But for you who fear my name, there will arise the sun of justice with its healing rays.

Reading II 2 Thessalonians 3:7-12

Brothers and sisters:

You know how one must imitate us. For we did not act in a disorderly way among you, nor did we eat food received free from anyone. On the contrary, in toil and drudgery, night and day we worked, so as not to burden any of you. Not that we do not have the right. Rather, we wanted to present ourselves as a model for you, so that you might imitate us. In fact, when we were with you, we instructed you that if anyone was unwilling to work, neither should that one eat. We hear that some are conducting themselves among you in a disorderly way, by not keeping busy but minding the business of others. Such people we instruct and urge in the Lord Jesus Christ to work quietly and to eat their own food.

Gospel - Luke 21:5-19

While some people were speaking about how the temple was adorned with costly stones and votive offerings, Jesus said, "All that you see here-- the days will come when there will not be left a stone upon another stone that will not be thrown down." Then they asked him, "Teacher, when will this happen? And what sign will there be when all these things are about to happen?" He answered, "See that you not be deceived, for many will come in my name, saying, 'I am he,' and 'The time has come.' Do not follow them! When you hear of wars and insurrections, do not be terrified; for such things must happen first, but it will not immediately be the end." Then he said to them, "Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom. There will be powerful earthquakes, famines, and plagues from place to place; and awesome sights and mighty signs will come from the sky. "Before all this happens, however, they will seize and persecute you, they will hand you over to the synagogues and to prisons, and they will have you led before kings and governors because of my name. It will lead to your giving testimony. Remember, you are not to prepare your defense beforehand, for I myself shall give you a wisdom in speaking that all your adversaries will be powerless to resist or refute. You will even be handed over by parents, brothers, relatives, and friends, and they will put some of you to death. You will be hated by all because of my name, but not a hair on your head will be destroyed. By your perseverance you will secure your lives."

Take some time to reflect on the readings before Sunday's Mass to enhance your understanding and help you engage in the readings as you hear them proclaimed.
