"And the angels ministered to him," today's gospel speaking of Jesus' being driven into the desert. We often wonder how we can last forty days and forty nights. How did Jesus do it? And so during our days, we must call up the angels, and saints to minister to us. Many of you have read or maybe heard of several upcoming canonizations of saints. One in particular is Blessed Father Damien of Molokai who will be canonized on October 11. Father Damien de Veuster of Belgium died among the lepers he went to Hawaii to minister to after contracting the disease himself. He died at the age of 49, known as the Apostle of the Lepers. I had the opportunity to visit his tomb in Leuven, Belgium several years ago. It was truly a moving experience. He will be the ninth saint to be canonized who lived and died in the land of the United States. The other eight include: Saints Elizabeth Ann Seton, John Neumann, Rose Dushesne, Isaac Jogues, Rene Goupil, Mother Katharine Drexel, Mother Frances Cabrini, and Mother Theodore Guerin.

We truly never know the angels ministering to us. Let us open ourselves this Lent to the power of God's love working in and through us through Jesus in the Holy Spirit.

Pray for our catechumen, Tracy, who today will be presented to Bishop Fellhauer at the Cathedral at 3:00 p.m. After her election, she will now be a member of the elect for the Easter Sacraments. Pray also for our candidates; Jason, Manuel, Edward, Alfredo who will be called to continuing conversion at the same ceremony.

Our Catechesis on the Sacraments Continues: Overview of Confirmation

Baptism was covered in Sunday, January 11 bulletin

Can. 879 The sacrament of confirmation confers a character. By it the baptized continue their path of Christian initiation. They are enriched with the gift of the Holy Spirit, and are more closely linked to the Church. They are made strong and more firmly obliged by word and deed to witness to Christ and to spread and defend the faith.

THE CELEBRATION OF CONFIRMATION

Can. 880 §1 The sacrament of confirmation is conferred by anointing with chrism on the forehead in a laying on of hands, and by the words prescribed in the approved liturgical books.

§2 The chrism to be used in the sacrament of confirmation must have been consecrated by a Bishop, even when the sacrament is administered by a priest.

Can. 881 It is desirable that the sacrament of confirmation be celebrated in a church and indeed during Mass. However, for a just and reasonable cause it may be celebrated apart from Mass and in any fitting place.

THE MINISTER OF CONFIRMATION

Can. 882 The ordinary minister of confirmation is a Bishop. A priest can also validly confer this sacrament if he has the faculty to do so, either from the general law or by way of a special grant from the competent authority.

Can. 883 The following have, by law, the faculty to administer confirmation:

1^o within the confines of their jurisdiction, those who in law are equivalent to a diocesan Bishop;

2^o in respect of the person to be confirmed, the priest who by virtue of his office or by mandate of the diocesan Bishop baptizes an adult or admits a baptized adult into full communion with the Catholic Church;

3^o in respect of those in danger of death, the parish priest or indeed any priest.

Can. 884 §1 The diocesan Bishop is himself to administer confirmation or to ensure that it is administered by another Bishop. If necessity so requires, he may grant to one or several specified priests the faculty to administer this sacrament.

§2 For a grave reason the Bishop, or the priest who by law or by special grant of the competent authority has the faculty to confirm, may in individual cases invite other priests to join with him in administering the sacrament.

Can. 885 §1 The diocesan Bishop is bound to ensure that the sacrament of confirmation is conferred upon his subjects who duly and reasonably request it.

§2 A priest who has this faculty must use it for those in whose favor it was granted.

Can. 886 §1 A Bishop in his own diocese may lawfully administer the sacrament of confirmation even to the faithful who are not his subjects, unless there is an express prohibition by their own Ordinary.

§2 In order lawfully to administer confirmation in another diocese, unless it be to his own subjects, a Bishop needs the permission, at least reasonably presumed, of the diocesan Bishop.

Can. 887 A priest who has the faculty to administer confirmation may, within the territory assigned to him, lawfully administer this sacrament even to those from outside the territory, unless there is a prohibition by their own Ordinary. He cannot, however, validly confirm anyone in another territory, without prejudice to the provision of can. 883, n.3.

Can. 888 Within the territory in which they can confer confirmation, ministers may confirm even in exempt places.

THE PERSONS TO BE CONFIRMED

Can. 889 §1 Every baptized person who is not confirmed, and only such a person, is capable of receiving confirmation.

§2 Apart from the danger of death, to receive confirmation lawfully a person who has the use of reason must be suitably instructed, properly disposed and able to renew the baptismal promises.

Can. 890 The faithful are bound to receive this sacrament at the proper time. Parents and pastors of souls, especially parish priests, are to see that the faithful are properly instructed to receive the sacrament and come to it at the opportune time.

Can. 891 The sacrament of confirmation is to be conferred on the faithful at about the age of discretion, unless the Episcopal Conference has decided on a different age, or there is a danger of death or, in the judgment of the minister, a grave reason suggests otherwise.

SPONSORS

Can. 892 As far as possible the person to be confirmed is to have a sponsor. The sponsor's function is to take care that the person confirmed behaves as a true witness of Christ and faithfully fulfills the duties inherent in this sacrament.

Can. 893 §1 A person who would undertake the office of sponsor must fulfill the conditions mentioned in can. 874.

§2 It is desirable that the sponsor chosen be the one who undertook this role at baptism.
